


HOW TO SEARCH JSTOR

JSTOR provides the full text to back issues of over 100 scholarly humanities, social sciences, and science journals. Articles are included in the database as published, and coverage for most titles begins with the very first issue.




SEARCH brings up the Basic Search screen.

BROWSE lets you look at broad topics that are represented in the database, or you can look at various volumes or issues of the journals that are available.




Type any keywords that describe your topic in the empty box(es). A search of each entire article in the system (full text) is the default search, but you can click the arrowhead to search the terms as an author, title, abstract, or caption search.

DON'T FORGET to click on the small empty boxes beside all of the disciplines that apply to your topic. JSTOR needs to know which category of journals you want to search.



Scroll down to see the bottom of the search screen as shown. Click the small empty boxes beside each **Type** of information you'd like to find. Limiting your search according to **Publication Date** retrieves articles published within the time period you type. Sorting your retrieval by **Highest Scoring** means the articles that contain your search terms most often will appear first in your results list. Click on this arrowhead when you want to sort your results by the **Most Current** or **Oldest** information available.

Once you've clicked on your selections, click on **Begin Search** to see your results.



Click on **Modify Search** to narrow the scope of your search, or if you are satisfied with your results, click on the **blue underlined title** in each citation in order to look at the entire article. Once the article's pages are on screen, you may click **Print** to obtain a copy of the information. Clicking on **Download** and choosing either **PDF High Quality** or **Economy** enables you to print, save the article to a floppy disk, or email yourself a copy of it.
